

Introduction to Willow Creek East

"Your standing as a Scout does not depend so much on the skills of your hands or the badges on your merit badge sash, as on the spirit in your heart...." This quote from the 6th edition of the Boy Scout Handbook sums up the main purpose of the Willow Creek East Scout Competition; that is, to test your Scout Spirit. Although you will be challenged to tie knots, build fires, and answer questions on Scout knowledge, these are only half the challenges. We also look for the Patrol Method, individual safety, a cheerful attitude, and obedience to leadership and proper respect for the senior Scouts and adults. We are not only scoring how much you know, we want to see how well you are living the Scout life.

Willow Creek East is not the type of event where you can focus on any one aspect of the competition and expect to win. Your unit must put effort into every aspect of this event.

A little more info about this compass course-based competition

Patrol(s) will use a map, magnetic directions, and a compass, to find the various stations. The directions are given in such a way that there is a prescribed order in which patrols are to do the Skill Stations. Points are assigned for the order of the stations and are part of the competition. If a patrol arrives at a Skill Station out of order before noon on Saturday, they will be told to return to their last point. After 12 noon, patrols will be allowed to compete at the station "out-of-order". Each station is worth 100 points. Each member in the patrol will be given a bead after completing each Skill Station. Keep track of these, as a complete set is required to finish the course.

Here are some brief explanations of the various stations.

Marksmanship: Scouts will get to demonstrate their skill in shooting at stationary Archery targets. Scores will be based upon the grouping of 5 shots on the targets.

Closed compass course: This is a small test of orienteering skills. Scouts will need to know how to use a compass, as well as how to measure distances.

Fire building: Scouts will be provided kindling and wood to build a fire. Tinder will need to be obtained on-site. They will then use a suitable ignition method (friction, flint and steel, magnesium spark, etc.), that they have brought with them, to light a sustainable knee-high fire. A small tin with one cup of water and some dish soap in it will be suspended over the fire. Get this water boiling in the least amount of time! Points will be based on the method of ignition and the time used.

First Aid: Patrols will be given an open-book written test. There is also a practical test where patrols will have to deal with a mock situation. Be sure to brush up on First Aid. **Warning to those who don't like the sight of blood; these victims can be quite graphic.**

**First Aid is not available at this Skill Point. Proceed to the Administration Tent if First Aid is needed.*

Knots: Scouts will be asked to tie all the basic knots and lashings.

Obstacle course: A challenging course which includes various tubes and other barricades. The event will test your endurance, skill, and speed.

Scout knowledge: The title is self-explanatory: it is a written test that covers all the areas of Scout knowledge.

Flag etiquette: Patrols will perform a flag ceremony and take a written test. Field uniforms must be worn at the station.

Instructional station (Demonstration Area): These are a grouping of several displays showcasing a variety of things. These may include the telegraph, the Civil War, metallurgy, mountain men etc.

Map Test: When patrols have completed the entire course, they will end up back at the Administration tent. There, they will be given a test with 25 questions worth 100 points. There will also be a bonus question concerning longitude and latitude worth 20 points. Patrols will be required to show a complete set of beads.

Your campsite at the camporee

The Willow Creek East camporee campsites will be in the newly established Mountain Man Area on the hill above the lake and behind the Chapel shelter at Camp Rock Enon (CRE). The environment is light oak woods with several open areas.



Your camp at Willow Creek East is very important: it will be your sleeping quarters, eating facilities, and recreation area. As part of the competition, it will be inspected for cleanliness, order, and safety. The more time and effort you put into preparing and setting up your camp, the better it will look and the higher it will score. Please use only as much space as you need.

Your camp needs to be the model Scout camp. All the proper knots, lashings, and safety rules should be used. Dispose of garbage and store it appropriately. All garbage should be in trash cans. All personal gear should be organized, and all patrol gear in boxes. Also, all suspended ropes or guy-lines, must be flagged with some type of marker tape so as not to be a hazard.

There is no pure drinkable water source at the Willow Creek East Campsite area, so all water must be ported in by each Unit. If you would like to have wood for a campfire, you must bring it.

Perimeter and gateway: Your camp should be marked off by a rope or cord suspended by poles or stakes. In addition, you should have a gateway entry into your camp. It can be as simple as three poles lashed together or as complex as you wish to make it.

Shelters: Tents are highly recommended for this event, as the weather can suddenly change. High winds, hail and rain, have been known to hit during this time of year. The tents always need to be kept clean and neat. There are no trees available to attach hammock-style tents.

Fire precautions: A bucket of sand and a bucket of water should be kept by all sources of fire and by each tent. If you wish to have a fire in your campsite, please build a fire-ring that follows all Scout safety precautions and Leave No Trace requirements. No fireworks are permitted.

Tool precautions: Your campsite should include a space where camp tools are stored when not in use. Many Units have a gear tent, dedicated to storing troop gear on-site. Your site should have an axe yard. Again, you should follow all safety precautions when constructing these sites. All safety rules should be followed concerning these tools. You can find more information regarding safety in the Scout Handbook.

Cooking: Each patrol should have a means of storing all their cooking equipment. Also, every Patrol / Unit should have its own clearly defined cooking area.

Menus and Duty Rosters: Patrols will be required to post menus and duty rosters in an obvious place. All the members of a patrol should share in the duties of the patrol. See the Appendix for a copy of an example Patrol Menu/Duty Roster.

Inspections

In the spirit of Scouting, and so that the staff may insure that you are maintaining a clean camp and a fit unit, Saturday and Sunday will include both camp and uniform inspections.

Camp Inspections: During the competition on Saturday and sometime Sunday morning, the Senior Patrol Leaders will inspect each campsite. They will be looking for compliance with the standards mentioned throughout this guide. Also, no one, except the SPLs (and crew Presidents), may enter the campsites after 9am on Saturday and until after the Special Event on Sunday. Units will be docked points for a violation of this rule. Your unit's SPL or President will be present during camp inspection.

For a more detailed guide on how your unit will be scored during the campsite inspection, please review the Camp Inspection Sheet in the Appendix.

Uniform Inspections: After the Flag Ceremony each morning, the SPLs will inspect all registered members of each troop/crew and two adults for uniforms. Uniform Inspection score is based on 50 points for Scouts and 50 points for adult leaders each day. Full Field uniforms include hat, dress shirt and neckerchief (Venture crews do not need to have a neckerchief), shorts or pants with belts, and socks. Throughout the Saturday compass course, the patrol should be in the Activity uniform but may elect to participate in the full Field Uniform. Patrol uniforms do play a role in the score that the patrols will receive at each skill station. Field uniforms are required at the Flag Etiquette Skill Station to receive full points. If patches are not properly placed or attached, points will be deducted. Also, if we see adults passing uniform parts to Scouts for the inspection, points will be deducted. Scouts should carry a separate t-shirt for First Aid. Remember Scouts are to be prepared.

Overall Scoring

Your unit's overall score is determined by the patrols' performance at the events and the troop's/crew's excellence as a unit. For the patrols on the compass course, there is a total of 1200 (plus any additions) points. For the troop/crew, there is a total of 1000-1200 (plus additions) points. This comes to a total of 2200-2400+ possible points for your troop/crew. However, the total points can vary from year to year depending on what scoring events we add or remove each year (e.g. Scout Master Tests).

The minimum number of points at each event is 60. Zero points are given for no effort and deductions will be made for any misbehavior.

Service Projects

If your unit wishes to score further points in the overall competition, you may complete a service project approved by the camp staff. Project assignments can be obtained at the Administration tent.



Unit Activity Sponsors:

We will need several Units to sponsor each of the activities for the camporee and attending Units will be expected to assist in running the activities.

All the activities will have a coordination packet, supplies, and support materials provided to assist the sponsoring Unit with the planning, organization, set-up and running of the station for the camporee. To "Keep It Interesting" sponsoring Units will be permitted to "put their own spin" on the event, within certain guidelines.

All Sponsoring Units must be identified by February 21, 2019 for coordination purposes.

Individuals and Units wanting to sponsor an activity should contact the Willow Creek East Coordinator (cdgarvin@yahoo.com) directly.

NOTE: Without the Unit Sponsors, there is no Camporee!

Activity Sponsors Needed:

- Administration - check-in/out, safety, scoring, event management (*Unit*)
- Medical - provide medical over site and first aid treatment (*Individual*)
- Communications - coordinate event communications, scoring transmission during the competition (*Individual*)
- SPL Administration - coordinate SPL activities, camp inspections, campfires (*Individual*)
- Demonstration Area - coordinate, manage various Scout & Public displays, demos, etc. (*Unit or Individual*)
- Activity Stations - coordinate, setup, run, score each skills station (*Unit*)

All skill station managers will communicate hourly to headquarters concerning their status and scoring related issues. Any awards the stations plan to grant need to be submitted to the Willow Creek East staff prior to the start of the course.

Schedule

A detailed schedule is in the Appendix.

Campfires: There are campfires on both Friday and Saturday nights. Units will need to bring required skit items larger than softballs to the final SM/SPL meeting. These items will be recorded and then redistributed out to another unit. The receiving unit will use these items to create a skit for one of the two nights. The skit will be graded upon the use of the received/required items along with Scout spirit, teamwork, creativity, volume, plot, and use of allotted time. This score will be added to the overall troop/crew score in the competition.

*** NOTE: Keep skits clean and of good taste! ***

Lights Out: Midnight is Lights Out. Please be respectful of other units by being in bed by midnight. Please speak quietly because most people will be sleeping.

Religious Services: Sunday morning service is non-denominational. Should your unit not wish to participate we would ask that you hold your own quiet time away from your campsite. Please respect the worship time of camp by being as quiet as possible.

Youth Protection:

The following policies have been adopted to provide security for the youth in our programs. In addition, they serve to protect adult leadership from situations in which they are vulnerable to allegations of abuse. ALL BSA REGISTERED VOLUNTEERS ATTENDING MUST HAVE CURRENT YOUTH PROTECTION TRAINING.

Two-Deep Leadership: Two registered adults or one registered adult leader and a parent of a participant who must be at least 21 years of age or older, are required on all trips and outings. No exceptions are allowed. At least two leaders must be with the unit 24 hours a day.

No One-to-One Contact: (With the exception of a parent and their son or daughter)

One-to-one contact between adults and youth members is not permitted. In situations that require a personal conference, the meeting is to be conducted in view of other adults and youth.

Respect of Privacy: Adult leaders must respect the privacy of youth members in situations such as changing into swimming suits or taking showers at camp and intrude only to the extent that health and safety requires. Adults must also protect their own privacy in similar situations. When camping, no youth is permitted to sleep in the tent or cabin of an adult other than his own parent or guardian.

Abuse: Adult and unit leaders are not to use physical, mental, or verbal abuse on youth.

This includes any threatening manner toward any youth or other person. Camp Rock Enon Is a SAFE HAVEN for all who visit. **Any actions or suspected behavior of this type is to be reported immediately to the Camp Director. It is the policy of the Boy Scouts of America that any suspected abuse of any kind be reported to the appropriate authorities.**

General Willow Creek East Information

Registration: To register for the camporee go to www.sac-bsa.org/willowcreekeastcamporee. To insure your Unit a spot at the Camporee reservations must be made online by the reservation deadline of April 1, 2019.

Questions concerning registration are to be directed to the Shenandoah Area Council Service Center attention kari.judson@scouting.org or 540-662-2551.

NOTE: Registered units may add individuals to their numbers up to and including the day of the Camporee. Non-registered Units/Individuals will be accepted only on a Space Available basis.

Payments: Payment should be made to the Shenandoah Area Council, BSA via credit card when you register online. Payments made on-site at the camporee can be made via cash or check.

Refund Policy: The official refund policy of the council is: All individual refunds are to be requested in writing, by mail, email, or fax. Refund requests made more than one week after the Camporee will NOT be considered. The amount of the refund will be determined once the request is received and based on the relation to the start of the camporee.- Fees may be applied to another individual attending the Camporee and should be arranged for in advance. Fees cannot be rolled-over to a future event or activity. A \$5 cancellation fee, per person, will be subtracted from ALL refunds to cover processing costs by the Council. Refunds requested due to medical reasons and other unforeseen circumstances will be reviewed on an individual basis and may require additional documentation.

Pro-Rated Refund Schedule:

- 30 days or more Full Refund, less \$5 Council cancellation fee.
- 15-29 days 75% Refund, less \$5 Council cancellation fee.
- 8-14 days 50% Refund, less \$5 Council cancellation fee.
- 7 days 25% Refund, less \$5 Council cancellation fee.
- 6 days or less NO REFUND

Check In: (located at Akela Cabin / Shelter across from the parking lot)

Unit and/or Individual check-in will be available on Friday May 17th, between 12:00 and 10:00 PM. All units and/or Individuals MUST check-in at the designated registration area before proceeding to the camporee campsite areas. Early arrivals are welcome to gather at the parking lot. Any arrivals after the designated registration time period will be processed, as staff is available.

Trip permits: To attend Willow Creek East, each unit (troop or crew) must have a roster of all participants and contact information. Roster forms are available in the Appendix

Vehicles: *There is a STRICT policy of ONE vehicle, per Unit, in the campsite at a time.*

One vehicle at a time will be allowed to drive to the camporee campsite area (weather and road conditions permitting) and unload. Try and support the 10-minute time limit for vehicles being in camp so all Units can get their gear transported in a timely manner. Remember, ALL vehicles and trailers must be returned to the parking lot after unloading. No trailers or vehicles will be allowed in the campsite area unless there is a need and has been coordinated and approved in advance by the Camporee Admin Staff.

Parking: Each unit will be required to park all vehicles and trailers within the designated Parking Lot located at CRE. Please note, there are no guaranteed trailer spaces, and they cannot remain in camp. **No vehicles are allowed in the camp area after 9:00 p.m. Friday night.** The only exception will be for vehicles used to carry supplies for the skill points on Saturday. Any vehicle found in camp will cause the loss of points for the associated unit.

Camp Visitors: Family and friends interested in visiting camp are welcome to do so. We request that visitors park in the CRE Parking Lot, check in at the Akela cabin across from the parking lot to sign in and receive a visitor's wrist band before they walk up to the camping or program areas. Visitors are not permitted to drive to the camping or program area without prior approval.

Webelos & Adult Patrols: Webelos Dens coming up on Saturday, will have a special opportunity to visit each of the competition events, interact with the Scouts and Staff and try their hand at each of the skill stations. Also, during the competition, adults signed up, will be able to complete the outdoor portion of the "Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills" (IOLS) training by competing on the course and finishing a few additional requirements. An IOLS Mentor will be part of the Admin Staff and implements the program. While Webelos and Adult Patrols will be allowed to run the course, Boy Scout/Venture patrols take precedence at all the stations.

Emergencies: Emergency procedures will be discussed during the opening ceremony at the camporee. These will vary according to the emergency and an information sheet will be provided to each unit upon check in, outlining the various emergency procedures. Please note: senior staff manages Emergencies and Incident Command and all off site communication should go through them.

Medical: Each Unit should have on-hand, a current Annual Health and Medical Record, with Parts A and B, completed within the past 12 calendar months for all leaders, and campers in attendance. The form may be found at <http://www.scouting.org/scoutsource/HealthandSafety/ahmr.aspx>. The Camp Director reserves the right to restrict physical activity to any camper in consultation with the health officer on duty.

Medications: Upon check-in, Unit leaders should review with the Health Officer on duty, any prescribed medicines they have with them for members of their Unit. Prescription Medication must be stored securely by each Unit. The health officer on duty may provide over the counter medicine only with the approval of a parent or guardian.

- *All first aid treatment MUST be reported to the Health Officer on duty.*

Insurance: Each (SAC) Scout attending the Camporee is covered by secondary health and accident insurance. This insurance covers only illnesses or injuries contracted during the Camporee for the first \$150.00. The Scouts' or Scouters' insurance is responsible for any additional amount. Medical insurance information must be on the medical form for each Scout and Scouter and a copy of the front and back of the insurance card must be attached to the medical form. Insurance claims will be paid only to the doctor or hospital.

Bathrooms: Portable bathrooms will be placed around camp. For health reasons, and given the number of participants in camp, please make sure to use the portable bathrooms. Use of “cat holes” is NOT permitted at this event due to its relationship to the streams and river. As there will be many people in such a small area, this would present a major health issue. Encourage all your members to keep the bathrooms clean. **There will be no toilet paper in the bathrooms, so bring all the tissue you will need.**

The portable bathrooms in the demo area is reserved for adults. A ladies bathroom will be designated and located here as well.

Special Note: Any person caught vandalizing the toilets will be financially responsible for the damages.

Time: The official Willow Creek East time will be kept at a clock in the Administration tent.

Message Center: A message board will be set up at the Administration tent for participants’ use.

Electronics: Scouts are NOT allowed to have any electronic devices in their possession. Adults can have certain electronics if they pertain to the functioning of the skill stations.

First Aid: First Aid will be available at the Administration tent.

Lost & Found: If you find a lost item, please take it to the Administration tent.

Meal Service: There is no meal service provided for this event. Units are required to plan, prepare, cook and clean up their own meals during the event. Units should bring their own potable water for drinking and cleaning. Units should bring their own ice and properly store food items and trash.

Tobacco: Camp Rock Enon strives to be a tobacco free environment. Adult leaders (and guests) are asked to use discretion in using tobacco. This includes the use of electronic cigarettes, personal vaporizers or electronic nicotine delivery systems which simulates tobacco smoking. Do not smoke in campsites. Smoking is prohibited in all buildings and tents.

The designated tobacco use area is the shelter located to the left of Akela Lodge across from the parking area. Please dispose of all butts properly.

Firearms: Firearms, ammunition and archery equipment are available for use on the rifle or archery range. No personal firearms or archery equipment will be permitted in camp. No exceptions!

Fires: No open flames are permitted in any tent. This includes all candles including citronella, and chemical fueled lanterns and stoves.


Fuels: For safety reasons, knowledgeable adult supervision must be provided when Scouts are involved in the handling of chemical fuels. All liquid fuel is to be kept in a fuel box located in a controlled area by the Unit. Camp Rock Enon follows the National liquid fuel policy. This includes no storage in trailers.

Checkout: A Scout is CLEAN, you are expected to leave your campsite in better condition than you found it. All trash should be hauled out by each Unit. Each campsite will be inspected prior to a Unit being released from the competition.

DIRECTIONS TO CAMP ROCK ENON

Driving directions From Route 37 west of Winchester, VA
to 292 Rock Enon Springs Rd, Gore, VA 22637
15.3 mi – about 28 minutes

- Follow US-50 West for 10.0 miles
- Turn left at Gore Rd for 0.5 miles
- Turn left at Back Creek Rd/VA-718 Continue to follow Back Creek Rd for 4.5 mi
- Turn left at Rock Enon Springs Rd/VA-683 for 0.4 mi
- Proceed past the Rangers house and Garrabrandt Lodge. You will see a small lake on the right.
- Go PAST the main entrance gate into camp and park in the parking lot on the right.

7:00am – Flag Ceremony and uniform inspection (Full Class A = Full Points). Troop + 2 adults.

7:30a -8:30am -- Breakfast

8:30am – SPLs meet to start their day

9:00am – Main Event. – Day long Compass Course begins. At each station the patrol will have a Scout Skill to do. Total Score of the course will be total time, accuracy and point for each skill completed. Lunch should be ‘trail ready’ and carried.

Everyone out of camp until 6pm. SPLs inspect camps. Your SPL will participate in the inspection of your unit’s camp site.

12:00pm – Cannon shot. Patrols allowed to finish stations, without being sent back to prior stations

5:00pm – Cannon shot. Patrols have 30 minutes to return to Admin tent

5:30pm – Course closes. Last time to start map test at Admin tent. Participants can return to camp

6:30pm – Written map test must be turned in at Admin tent

9:00pm – SPL Camp fire. OA callout and honor trail during this camp fire

12:00am – Taps (Lights out and quiet time)

Sunday

6:30am – Reveille

7:00am – Flag Ceremony and uniform inspection (Full Class A = Full Points). Troop + 2 adults.

7:30-8:30am -- Breakfast

8:45am-9:30am - Religious Service

9:45am – Special event prep

10:00–11:30 – Special Event

12:30pm – Lunch Pickup. All must be in full Class A uniform.
(You will need, Full Class A Uniform, a plate, a cup and fork or spoon)

2:00pm – Closing Ceremony and Awards.

2:30p – Pack up and head home.

Notes:

If a troop/crew does not have a fire pit, an axe yard is not required and will not be deducted.

Points will be deducted in the Camp Area Safety section for safety violations; unattended fires, unsafe tool storage, unmarked tent ropes, etc.

Adult and Scout tents should be segregated. Adult tents will not be inspected although the area around them will be. SPL must assure that no “stray gear” has been stashed in the adult tent(s).

Adults or Scouts in camp during the campsite inspection will be counted as “gear adrift”/litter unless they have a valid medical reason verified by Willow Creek Staff.

Item organization in camp boxes is not a deductible part of the score.
